Enquiry Question this term: What impact did the British Empire have?

This term we will be learning all about the British Empire and the impact it had on the world. If you have any books or artefacts, you would be happy to lend to the class for this term, we would be very grateful. Make sure they are named. We will be historians as we explore big questions about colonialism, In week one, the children will pose their own questions relating to this and throughout the term we will explore and answer these.

Learn Together

Equality and justice

We will learn how the democratic process works nationally. Explore what it means to be a global citizen with specific reference to the Sustainable Development Goals.

Engage in research on the meaning of equality by examining the following issue: racism

Engage in research on the work of a prominent figure or group in social justice activism in the UK, past or present addressing the following issue: gender inequality.

Identify an equality issue nationally and engage in activism to address this issue e.g. through awareness raising, letters to national representatives.

Rights Respecting Schools

This term we will focus in particular at these three rights:

Article 8: You have the right to an identity – an official record of who you are. No one should take this away from you.

Article 14: You have the right to choose your own religion and beliefs. Your parents should help you decide what is right and wrong, and what is best for you.

Article 12: You have the right to give your opinion, and for adults to listen and take it seriously.

English

Our focus book this term is the Last Alchemist. We will analyse character, setting and plot and how the author shows this through language features. We will then write our own version of a wishing tale.

Our main focus in writing will be recapping the grammatical skills learned in Year 5 first through fiction and then through non fiction writing. These skills include relative clauses, fronted adverbials, using various tenses effectively, using complex sentences and showing cohesion throughout a paragraph and across paragraphs.

In guided reading sessions, children will continue to build comprehension and understanding. VIPERS are the skills we will be focussing on Vocabulary, Inference, Prediction. Explain, Retrieval and Summarising. Using our focus book and then Magic Born by Peter Bunzl.

Maths

We will focus on Place Value for number up to 1,000,000.



As scientists we will study Living things and their habitats

- Explore how living things are classified into common observable features, similarities and differences including micro-organisms, plants and animals
- Give reasons for classifying plants and animals based on specific characteristics

As designers, artists and creators we will:

Exploring Identity

 Discover how artists use layers and juxtaposition to create artwork which explores identity. Make your own layered portrait.

- As historians we will study the British Empire
- Learn about significant events in the history of the British Empire
- In-depth study of the British Empire, studying its significance locally, nationally and globally and exploring the ethical issues that arise though enquiry.

On **Wednesdays and Fridays**, Jess will be taking PE sessions where we will focus on badminton and netball.

School PE Kit

Children will need to come to school wearing clothing and footwear that is suitable to exercise in on their PE days. Here is a list of things that would be suitable to wear on these days. We ask that all items are clearly labelled with your child's name and year group so that it does not get lost.

- Your child needs to bring their reading record, reading book and spelling journal into school everyday.


Reading

School Expectations

- Reading Record and colour banded book should be brought to school daily.
- Read for 15 minutes and record in your Reading Record a minimum of four times a week and ask an adult to sign.
- This should include time to hear your child read and talk through what they have read, identifying tricky vocabulary and asking questions to see if they have understood what they have read. E.g. How do the descriptions of show that they are How can you tell that..... What impression of do you get from these paragraphs? Why did the character behave like that?
- After visiting the Library, children will also choose a book to read for pleasure which you can enjoy with them.
- In Upper Key Stage 2 reading is an opportunity to find and learn new vocabulary to improve your writing. Records any new words you learn in your reading and the definition in your Reading Record.
- If you are not recording reading, you will be expected to attend a lunchtime club to catch up on reading.

Why is this important

- Reading is a fundamental skill which is the foundation of many other areas of learning and is important in children's future success.
- Research shows that reading promotes brain, language, and emotional development and that reading for pleasure strengthens relationships.
- Parent's role in the teaching of reading is paramount to your child's progress and this is highly valued by the school.

Maths

School Expectations

- Children need to practise our focus timetable each week using https://www.topmarks.co.uk/maths-games/hit-the-button
- Times Table Rock Stars can be used for daily practice
- Times tables are practised daily in school and sheets will be sent home for children who are not consistently scoring well.

Why is this important

- Times tables are essential and multiplication facts are non-negotiable basic building blocks of maths.
- Knowing the times tables (and their associated division facts) supports mathematical learning
- Children who have a strong grasp of them tend to be more self-assured when learning new concepts.
- Starting secondary school with a fluent, accessible and automatic knowledge of their tables is ideal.

Spelling

School Expectations

- Spelling Journal should be brought into school daily.
- Spellings will be checked and a new set given out every Monday. Children will have 12 spellings in total; six from the year 5/6 statutory list and six from the No Nonsense spelling patterns.
- Please help your child to practise at home by completing the 'Say, cover, write and check' worksheet and using the different strategies such as using rainbow colours for vowels or pyramid words shown on the termly sheet in their spelling books.

Why is this important

- Spelling is one of the essential components of successful writing.
- Research has found that spelling, reading, writing and comprehension skills are all closely linked.
- Spelling instruction improves reading ability and benefits them in all aspects of their learning, as well as in their everyday life.

Parent volunteers
